Title IX Case Study: Nonconsensual Sexual Penetration

"Nonconsensual Sexual Penetration" means any penetration of another's body parts without the person's consent. Including penetration of the vagina, anus, or mouth by a penis, object, tongue, finger, or other body part. Additionally, contact between the mouth of one person and the genitals or anus of another person.

Question Two: Did the Complainant Consent?
Consent must be evidenced by:
□ <u>words</u> that, when evaluated from the perspective of what a <i>Reasonable Person</i> who perceived the words, communicated the Complainant's knowing and voluntary willingness to participate in the mutually agreed upon sexual activity.
AND/OR
actions that, when evaluated from the perspective of what a <i>Reasonable Person</i> who perceived the actions, communicated the Complainant's knowing and voluntary willingness to participate in the mutually agreed upon sexual activity.
Note: Consent is absent when the activity in question exceeds the scope of consent previously give. Also, silence or the absence of resistance does not imply consent.

Question Three: Was Consent valid?		
Consent is invalid if the Complainant:		
 Was Forced to participate in penetration Examples of Force include physical force, threats of harm, words or conduct that would cause the Complainant to feel fear, a threat to disclose personal information, other immediate harm. 		
2. Was Incapacitated and the Respondent was (or RP would have been) aware of the Complainant's		
 Incapacitation Incapacitation the physical and/or mental inability to make informed, rational judgments. Judged from the perspective of Reasonable Person. Can result from: mental disability, sleep, involuntary physical restraint, intentional or unintentional taking of alcohol and/or other drugs. 		
3. Was an improper age to Consent		
 If the Complainant is under the age of 16 they cannot legally give consent under Georgia law 		
 4. Withdrew Consent and The Respondent failed to stop the act Consent can be withdrawn at any time by either party by using clear words or actions.
